10.2 <u>Transportation Update</u>: Kim Powell, Chief Operations Officer, shared key points from the Transportation Update provided by Mr. Garland Williams, Director of Transit. Information presented included:

City Transportation Snapshot

- 30 drivers needed for regular routes
- 40 is the goal to address relief & special needs
- Currently planning for 3 new routes after winter break
- 3 Routes will potentially serve an additional 378 students preK-12
- We are monitoring our immigrant student population and the additional impact this may have on transportation demands

Goals for the Department

- Continuous
 - Provide supportive, inclusive opportunities and services for students with disabilities.
 - Advocate for continued support for students with disabilities at the local and state level Short Term
 - By Spring 2022, improve Math & Literacy pass rate by 6%.
 - 2020-21 Math SWD SOL Pass Rate was 19% (state average 31%).
 - 2020-21 Reading SWD SOL Pass Rate was 34% (state average 40%).
- Long Term

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- By 2024, increase capacity from serving 18 students up to 30 students who require intensive social, emotional and behavioral instruction and supports
- By 2024, an increase in students served in CCS public school setting from 90 to 95%.

Mr. Bryant wanted to know if the instructional assistants get any special training. Ms. Rasnake stated that they do get training throughout the year, some of them being virtually.

Dr. Kraft asked if they are fully staffed with all the staff that they have? Ms. Lee ststed that we do have a few openings but they are actively looking for qualified staff for the openings that they have.

10.4 <u>2022-2023 Program of Studies</u>: Dr. Katina Otey, Chief Academic Officer, introduced Dr. Eric Irizarry, CHS Principal; Rodney Jordan, Buford Principal; Dr. Adam Hastings, Walker Principal; Ms. Jill Dahl, Program Administrator for Lugo-McGinness Academy; and Ms. Stephanie Carter, Director of CATEC, presented the 2022-2023 Program of Studies for Board information. Proposed changes presented included:

Walker Upper Elementary

- Elective Courses
 - Art and Spanish
 - Revised course description to reflect updated course content and pacing
 - Course description adjusted to reflect classroom-based differentiation for prior coursework experience
 - Band and Orchestra
 - Course descriptions adjusted to reflect classroom-based differentiation and grouping for prior coursework experience
 - Students may begin these courses in 5th or 6th grade
 - Introduction to Engineering
 - Course name adjusted from Pre-Engineering
 - Course description adjusted to reflect classroom-based differentiation for prior coursework experience

Buford Middle School

• Fine Arts

- Revised course descriptions to reflect updated course content, pacing, and prerequisites in Art, Band, Chorus, and Orchestra
- Adds Theater Arts exploratory and full-year course

Charlottesville High School

- Urban Farming
 - Currently coded as 9093 and 9094
 - Moving to Agricultural Education
 - Urban Farming 1 8022 Agricultural Business Fundamentals
 - Urban Farming 2 8024 Agricultural Business Operations
 - Buford already has Urban Farming (8022) established this school year
- Sports Medicine
 - Proposing Sports Medicine be moved to CTE
 - New condensed 140 hour version available to teach
 - Creates a new career cluster and new pathways available for students to explore
- Spanish for Fluent Speakers I
 - Designed for fluent speakers of Spanish and provides an opportunity to strengthen skills in their native language
 - Students will develop a deeper awareness and understanding of Hispanic cultures, customs, language variations, geography, history, and current events
- Digital Art II
 - Expansion of Digital Art/Illustration course
 - This course differs from Digital Art I by including the use of computers as a form of art-making.
 Students will use creative software, such as Adobe Photoshop and Adobe Illustrator to explore digital illustration techniques, graphic arts, animation, commercial advertising, and the fine arts.

Lugo-McGinness Academy

- Leadership Development & Leaders for Tomorrow
 - Currently coded as CTE courses at CHS
 - Adding as Non- CTE Credit for Locally Award Elective Credits at LMA for Social Emotional Learning grades 11 and 12

Charlottesville Albemarle Technical Education Center (CATEC)

- Culinary Specialization
 - Recommending removal from the Program of Studies
 - Course offered for 3 years without enrollment
- Salon Assistant
 - Recommending removal from the Program of Studies
 - Course offered for 3 years without enrollment

10.5 <u>2022-2023 School Year Calendar Presentation</u>: Dr. Katina Otey, Chief Academic Officer, presented the 2022-2023 School Calendar for Board information. Annually, the Charlottesville City School Board is charged with the development and approval of a calendar which must incorporate 180 days or 990 hours of instruction for students served in the school division. A draft of the 2022-2023 school calendar was posted on our website for review and comment. All comments received were taken into consideration when developing the proposed calendar. The calendar which is proposed for the 2022-2023 school year was developed in concert with the Albemarle County Schools at the request of the respective School Boards.</u>

Ms. McKeever expressed concern about the multiple long weekends in January, October, and November. Dr. Gurley replied that he appreciated Ms. McKeever's comments and that similar concerns were discussed during the committee planning meeting. He also noted that the calendar is developed around the 9-week blocks based on when school begins and that many of those dates cannot be controlled since they are holiday or non-school days to support election polling. Dr. Gurley expressed appreciation for the Charlottesville City Schools and

Albemarle County Public Schools Calendar Committees for collaborating and developing the proposed 2022-2023 School Year Calendar.

10.6 <u>COVID Update</u>: Dr. Beth Baptist, Interim Director of Student Services and Achievement and Human Resources, presented an update on COVID infections within the Division. Information presented included:

Blue Ridge Health District Information

- For the week of 11/14-11/20: 89 cases involving minors
- For the week of 11/21-11/27: 45 cases involving minors
- Cases ages 5-11 and 12-18 both down slightly from the week before
- 385 cases overall in the health district which is very similar to the week before.
- Testing schedule is on BRHD web page

• We continue to have testing 3 days per week at all school sites through the ViSSTA program. Fortunately we have only identified three positive tests from the beginning.

• We also have Binax Rapid Tests for the schools and "Let's Get Checked" PCR tests that are shipped out. Recommendations for Continued COVID Plans

Continue with

- all school-based mitigation,
- masking and
- vaccination efforts and/or testing requirements while we are in a small uptick and entering colder weather with more people clustered inside.
