The Three "E" Readiness Framework: Employment, Enlistment, AND Enrollment

EMPLOYMENT

1 point

CTE completer who also earns a stateapproved industry recognized credential in a high-demand, highwage field as defined by VOEE*

0.75 points

CTE completer who also earns a stateapproved industry recognized credential in a high-demand field as defined by VOEE**

0.5 points

CTE completer earning a stateapproved industry recognized credential.

*Virginia is participating in the <u>LAUNCH Pathways</u>, which will help further define the appropriate tiers for various industry recognized credentials.

**VDOE will be working with multiple work groups to better define work-based learning opportunities and incorporate that work into the employment section in the future.


Changes from originally-approved Employment framework

Work-based Learning Changes

- As proposed:
 - Misalignment with Graduation Requirements and 3E Readiness requirements
 - Of the 12 historic HQWBL experiences, only 4 will count towards meeting 3E Readiness
 - Apprenticeships, Internships, Clinical Experiences, School-Based Enterprises & Entrepreneurship
 - Requirements of the experiences will be more stringent
